Report of the APPPC Regional Training Workshop on "Integrated Control of Fruit Fly" In tandem with the 9th International Symposium on Fruit Flies of Economic Importance 9-11 May 2014, Bangkok, Thailand

1. Background

Tephritid fruit flies are becoming increasingly important, due to the economic importance of many species and their threat to fruit and vegetable production and trade worldwide. At the 28th Session of the Asia and Pacific Plant Protection Commission held in Jeju Island, Rep. of Korea, 23-27 September 2013, it was agreed that Thailand will host the training workshop on *Bactrocera* fruit fly surveillance, taxonomy and identification and area-wide management in tandem with the 9th International Symposium on Fruit Flies of Economic Importance in May 2014.

The APPPC Regional Training Workshop on Integrated Control of Fruit Fly in tandem with the 9th International Symposium on Fruit Flies of Economic Importance Meeting, therefore, was held during 9-11 May 2014, at Montien Riverside Hotel, Bangkok, Thailand. Thirty-one (31) delegates from 17 participating countries from Australia, Bangladesh, Cambodia, China, India, Indonesia, Lao, PDR, Malaysia, Nepal, Pakistan, Philippines, Solomon Islands, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Tonga and Vietnam, this includes experts from IAEA, AIT, DOAE of Thailand and Mexico.

2. Objectives

- 2.1 To provide technical knowledge and training to field operations staff on surveillance and baseline data collection to plan integrated fruit fly management activities including SIT application.
- 2.2 To demonstrate surveillance techniques used in fruit fly detection and control programmes, including trapping materials for adult surveys, as well as levels of infestation by fruit fly lavae
- 2.3 To provide lectures on basic useful information for the identification of fruit fly specimens.
- 2.4 To discuss and provide protocols used for collection and shipments of live and dead fruit fly specimens.
- 2.5 To provide practice on fruit fly identification of the genera *Bactrocera*
- 2.6 To facilitate exchange of practical experiences and new knowledge on area-wide fruit fly management options and the identification skills developed.

4. Results

4.1 <u>Lectures and practical exercises</u>

Session 1: fruit fly biology and ecology. (lectures)

1) Life cycle and population dynamics by Mr.Rui Cardoso Pereira

Participants acquired knowledge of general information of fruit flies, distribution, life cycle, host range of species, factors affecting fruit fly's population and control measures.

- 2) Fruit Sampling (larval surveillance) by Mr.Rui Cardoso Pereira
 Participants acquired knowledge of fruit fly surveys (using traps), detection of larvae in various kinds of fruits, fruit sampling and data collection, analysis and infestation evaluation.
- 3) Fruit fly trapping (adult surveillance) by Mr.Rui Cardoso Pereira

 Participants acquired knowledge of types of surveys, different trapping systems, attractants and species attracted, insecticides used in traps, trapping procedures, trap service and inspection, flies per trap per day (FTD) calculation and trapping density.

<u>Session 2</u>: fruit fly taxonomy and identification. (lecture and practice) Identification of Bactrocera spp. by Ms.Sunyanee Srikachar

Participants acquired knowledge of classification of fruit fly, fruit fly collection, morphology and terminology and identification of *Bactrocera* spp.. They also experienced fruit fly identification of genera *Bactrocela* from the practical exercise.

<u>Session 3</u>: fruit fly biological control. (lecture) Fruit fly biological control by Mr.Jorge Cancino Participants acquired knowledge of concept and importance of biological control, fruit fly parasitoid species, fruit fly biological control in the past, factors affecting parasitoid mass rearing and releasing and campaign on biological control of fruit flies in Mexico.

<u>Session 4</u>: GIS and mapping GIS in fruit fly control program and practical exercise by Ms.Sirilux Noykeang

Participants acquired knowledge of GIS system, components of GIS, QGIS application, GIS data and map production. They also tried using QGIS application.

<u>Session 5</u>: area-wide integrated pest management of fruit flies. (lectures)

1) Area-wide integrated pest management (AW- IPM) of tephritid fruit flies by Mr.Rui Cardoso Pereira

Participants acquired knowledge of fruit fly problem, area-wide concept, phased conditional approach, strategic options of area-wide IPM and examples of AW-IPM programs in Brazil and Croatia.

2) Area-wide integrated fruit fly control using SIT: case study in Chantaburi province, Thailand by Ms.Suksom Chinvinijkul

Participants acquired knowledge of History of fruit fly control in Thailand, set up of SIT facility, fruit fly control project using GPS/GIS and sterile fruit flies at Troknong subdistrict, Khlung district, Chantaburi province.

- 3) Integrated fruit fly control in rose apple orchard for export by Ms. Sunyanee Srikachar Participants learned from experience sharing of the research on integrated fruit fly control in rose apple orchard for export.
- 4) Area-wide management of Bactrocera fruit flies and IPM farmers field school-base education in the greater Mekong sub-region by Mr.Prabhat Kumar

Participants learned from experience sharing of pilot experiences of area-wide promotion and adoption of fruit fly IPM-FFS in lower Mekong river basin countries.

4.2 <u>Technical tour: Field visit to area-wide IPM of fruit fly control at Don Khlang subdistrict, Damnoen Saduak district, Ratchaburi province</u>

The orchard produces rose apple for export. Fruit fly is a major problem. There are 3 species found, such as *B. dorsalis*, *B. correcta* and *B. carambolae*. *B. dorsalis* is a dominant species. Fruit fly population increases in April which coincides with fruiting season and population decreases in June when there is no fruit on trees. The farmer applies 4 methods as recommended by Department of Agriculture to control fruit flies, including orchard sanitation, fruit fly population monitoring (using methyl eugenol and malathion), protein bait lures and fruit bagging. Modified traps made from plastic bottles are used to monitor fruit fly population (FTD). The fruits are protected from fruit fly infestation by bagging with white plastic bags. Bagging is done at 14 days and not later than 21 days after stamens fell off. Only 4 fruits are in a bag to meet the market standard. By applying these methods of fruit fly management, the farmer can export rose apple to China.

4.3 Conclusions

The session of biology and ecology may increase essential knowledge of participants for fruit fly management especially for NPPOs to implement system approaches (ISPM14) or establishment of pest free area for fruit fly for a specific targeted commodity production. It may also contribute to pest surveillance (ISPM6); The session of fruit fly taxonomy and identification would help participants have enhance impression on morphology of several typical species of fruit fly with highlighted specifications described and might be useful reference for identification of these The session of practical exercise on identification of genera Bactrocera enabled participants have first hand skills of identification of two species of fruit flies; The session of bio-control stressed that massive release an augmentative release of parasitoids as well as quality control and cost reduction are main elements of successful biological control of fruit flies for suppression of population; The session of GIS demonstrated value of application as a useful tool for mapping the pest distributions based on surveillance; The session of AW-IPM of ff highlighted important role of AW approach in pest control, principles of AW, phased conditional approach, strategic options of AW-IPM and examples of use of SIT and farmer filed school approach at field level. It was noted that establishment of cost-covering is one of important area of sustainable use of SIT.

The pilot experiences of AW-promotion and adoption of FF IPM FFS in GMS highlighted challenges for AW-FF IPM and experiences practice in adaptation research and FFS approach during the implementation of the regional project on AW-FF IPM with outputs of ff research, capacity building, FFS, etc. The importance of partnerships, integration of innovative products/management strategies into farmers' training curricula is key to the success. A number of projects on FF management in various countries, the knowledge learned from the workshop and the practical experience shared at the workshop may benefit participants especially those are involving in program or projects of fruit fly management to have further improvements either knowledge or operational capacity as well as in public awareness and community based participatory trainings to contribute improving farmers' income by producing health products and promoting exporting products.

It was proposed to strengthen networking of collaboration among countries in fruit fly management including information exchange and resource sharing. Area-wide IPM should be promoted in every country with financial and technical supports.
